WHY REVIVAL? THOUGHTS FROM STEVE:

"Revival, much like an unstoppable river, has gripped the imagination of countless generations. We desperately need God's presence—for God to come and fill our churches and transform our lives with His power, presence, and glory. So why isn't revival breaking out in churches everywhere? We must <u>connect to the spirit of truth</u>! Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life. Truth is a person: Jesus. We're missing out on truth because we're not focused on Jesus, what He says, and who He really is. There's really no set formula for revival. You just have to let God be God. But, we must also be open to how He works if we want to truly *get* revival. We cannot allow our pride and offense to prevent us from going where God leads. And we must let go of our preconceived notions of how revival should come, and humble ourselves before God, then He can transform our lives and churches beyond our wildest imaginations!"

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King grew up in a revivalistic household in Northwest Arkansas. His grandfather was an Assemblies of God pastor and a participant in the Salvation-Healing Revival—sitting under Jack Coe, A.A. Allen, and Oral Roberts. After attending Central Bible College in Springfield, Missouri in the mid-1990s, King moved to the cornfields of West Central Missouri to be a supporting leader in the Smithton Outpouring. In addition to pastoring, King served as the International Director of the Revival Network of Ministries and the Academic Dean at the Revival Training Center. He also developed curriculums, consulted ministry leaders, and traveled as speaker. A prolific writer, King has contributed articles to Christian publications and his blog posts gained a significant following—with over 1.5 million page views. King has written several books and in 2017 founded <u>Christos Publishing</u>, a company dedicated to producing superbly researched books informed by a Spirit-led worldview. King is known for his dedication and passion for the gospel. In addition to other duties, he serves as a pastor at Revive Church in Kansas City. King prays, leads Bible studies, spearheads evangelism efforts and provides practical guidance to those desiring to grow in their faith. J. D. and his wife, Bobbie, have been married twenty-seven years and reside in Lees Summit, Missouri with their kids. He enjoys spending time with his family.




SUGGESTED QUESTIONS

Unexpected things transpire when God shows up. The status quo is upended. Heavenly breakthroughs are unleashed that catch the eye and arrest the attention. I have witnessed these holy disruptions countless times.

I remember once when the Spirit came down on a group of people in rural Missouri. As they were seeking the Lord, the fire of the Holy Spirit swept over them, and they flew back three feet. It was a clear work of the Lord; no one touched them. I know this claim sounds bizarre, but I witnessed it with my own eyes.

Another time in a prayer gathering, I saw worshipers fall like dominoes— row by row— from the front to the back. As people were collapsing, some were crying and shrieking, while others were shaking. One of the individuals on the floor had been contemplating suicide, but God delivered her from the spirit of death. Others testified how God rescued them from depression, bitterness, and fear. One man said, "I don't think I would have believed you if you told me this is what happens. In fact, it might have even frightened me, but now I don't want to leave."

Unusual experiences transpire as people encounter the glory of God. On one occasion, a couple receiving prayer began behaving as if they were intoxicated. It was like the time in Acts when Peter said, "These men are not drunk as you suppose" (Acts 2:15 ISV). I've witnessed seekers so inundated by the Lord's presence that their speech was slurred and their legs were wobbly. Some had to be carried out to their cars because they were so overwhelmed.

One night, a couple was overcome by the Holy Spirit and had to be helped out of the building. On their way back to the hotel, some police officers pulled them over. They made both the man and the woman take a breathalyzer test and walk a straight line. The authorities didn't believe that this couple was experiencing the effects of a God encounter. Yet with no evidence of alcoholic intoxication, they had to release them.

As you can imagine, not everyone appreciated what was going on in these gatherings. A journalist from the *Word&Way*, a Missouri Southern Baptist periodical, visited the meetings and published a report titled "Slain in Smithton." Although mostly sympathetic, the article did question people collapsing under the weight of God's glory. The journalist quoted Dwain Carter, a Baptist pastor who visited the outpouring services. This minister said, "The worship, the music, and the sermon were excellent." He was uncomfortable, however, with individuals falling back while receiving prayer, and insisted, "The Bible says when you encounter God, you fall on your face."

Throughout history, people encountering the glory have crumbled to the ground in a myriad of different ways. As the Spirit moved, some fell on their faces. Others collapsed backward. I've even read accounts where people fell to their sides. The distinctions that this Baptist minister highlighted are virtually nonexistent in the annals of history. As the Holy Spirit draws near, there will often be a shaking "so that what cannot be shaken will remain" (Hebrews 12:27 NIV). I've watched the Lord do this kind of thing in restaurants, parking lots, and living rooms. God shows up in all sorts of places. I've seen people impacted at a movie theater and at a swimming pool. The glory of the Lord can come into all sorts of spheres. One time, I had to help someone get his car out of a ditch. He was so overwhelmed by the glory that he veered off the road.

I know this sounds extreme, but the Lord is still shaking whatever is shakable. We hold too tightly to the frivolous things. In a move of God, certain signs can attract outsiders and simultaneously reveal the callousness of insiders. Inexplicable wonders can force people to grapple with difficult questions. As the saying goes, sometimes God offends the mind to reveal the heart.

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
